17	appeared on behalf of the State of Minnesota;
18	Thomas C. Plunkett and Peter B. Wold, Attorneys at
19	Law, appeared on behalf of the Defendant, who was personally

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PROCEEDINGS \* \* 1 \* \* 2 (The following proceedings began at 1:35 p.m.) 3 THE CLERK: Calling from Line 15 of the 4 afternoon calender Mohamed Mohamed Noor. This is a first appearance, Your Honor. He is represented by 5 private counsel and needs to be ID'd. 6 7 THE COURT: Go ahead with the identification. 8 THE CLERK: Sir, can you please state and 9 spell your entire name. 10 Sure. My first name is THE DEFENDANT: 11 Mohamed, M-O-H-A-M-E-D; last name is Noor, N-O-O-R. 12 THE CLERK: And your middle name. 13 THE COURT: Mohamed, M-O-H-A-M-E-D. 14 THE CLERK: Date of birth, please. 15 THE COURT: 10/20/1985. 16 THE CLERK: And your current address. 17 THE COURT: Current address is 7318 Bass Lake 18 Road, New Hope, Minnesota 55428. 19 THE CLERK: Thank you. 20 THE COURT: I assume a copy of the complaint 21 has been served. 22 MR. PLUNKETT: Your Honor, we've received a 23 copy of the complaint. At this time, I would like to 24 waive a formal reading of the complaint. I'm also 25 going to waive formal time requirements for future

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1 hearings at this time. 2 THE COURT: Okay. 3 MS. SWEASY: Good morning -- or good 4 afternoon, Your Honor. Amy Sweasy appearing for the State of Minnesota for the Hennepin County Attorney. 5 That is correct. The compliant was served on defense 6 7 counsel yesterday, and, I believe, the Rule 7 and 9 notices have also been served. 8 9 MR. PLUNKETT: I'm sure they're coming. 10 THE COURT: All right. The issue of bail? 11 MS. SWEASY: Your Honor, the State is 12 requesting bail in the amount of \$500,000 as is 13 indicated on the complaint that was signed yesterday by 14 Judge Barnette. \$500,000 is the standard bail 15 quidelines in Hennepin County for murder in the third 16 degree, which is the highest count in this case. 17 Other factors contributing to the State's 18 request for bail in this case relate to, first of all, 19 the risk of non-appearance for future court 20 appearances. There were concerns in the fall that 21 Mr. Noor had left the country or the jurisdiction, at 22 least. We were able to resolve that, and he was, 23 actually, here in town. But we did have credible 24 information about that for a time. 25 Two other concerns with respect to that. We

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are aware of a witness who, at one time, offered 1 2 resources to Mr. Noor with respect to either bringing 3 him to an undisclosed location or hiding him. Those are the witness' words, not mine, with respect to that. 4 5 Finally, I am aware that the Minneapolis 6 Police Department no longer employs Mr. Noor as of 7 vesterday. That is a significant change of 8 circumstances that also results in reduced significant 9 community ties. Mr. Noor's job no longer keeps him 10 here in town. 11 So given the severity of the charge and those 12 factors, we would ask that the Court keep the bail at 13 \$500,000. We would ask, also, for conditions that 14 Mr. Noor surrender his passport; that he have no 15 contact with Minneapolis police officer Matthew 16 Harrity; and that he have no possession or use of any 17 firearms. 18 THE COURT: Mr. Plunkett. 19 MR. PLUNKETT: Thank you, Your Honor. 20 The State's request for a half of a million 21 dollar bail is, frankly, outrageous given what we know 22 about Mr. Noor and what we know about the case. 23 I'm asking the Court to order that he be 24 released on his promise to reappear and on the 25 condition that he turn in his passport. Frankly, the

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other conditions that were listed -- I don't have a
problem with those other conditions if the Court was
inclined to add those conditions.

As an initial matter -- and I don't believe 4 5 Ms. Sweasy disagrees with me -- Mr. Noor is not, does 6 not pose a threat to the public safety. Mr. Noor has lived here since he was about five years old. He grew 7 8 up here; he went to grade school in Minnesota; he went 9 to high school in Minnesota; and he went to college in 10 Minnesota. And now he lives in Minnesota with his 11 young family. He has no connections to any place else, 12 other than the fact of his birth.

13 Yes, it's true, he fled Somalia to avoid a 14 civil war. But that was when he was a baby, and he has 15 no recollection of any other home than here. Your 16 Honor, Mr. Noor is an American.

17 He's been cooperative, Your Honor. He's been 18 available. In July, when the BAC called and asked for 19 his DNA, he showed up within an hour and gave a voluntary sample of his DNA, no warrant needed. 20 In 21 November, Ms. Sweasy sent an investigator to speak with 22 him. The investigator left a note on his door. We 23 called the investigator back within minutes. 24 Ms. Sweasy's investigator wanted -- had heard this

rumor about the Somalia thing, and the investigator

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wanted to see Mr. Noor's face. Within an hour he was
at the city hall showing his face; although, he
certainly wouldn't have had to do that.

4 Yesterday, I got word from Ms. Sweasy that a 5 warrant had been issued. I got word about 10:00. By, I think, 11:16, according to the jail records, Mohamed 6 Noor had turned himself in. He's met with his precinct 7 8 lieutenant as recently as two weeks ago. He has 9 regular contact with his friends. He lives here, in 10 the Twin Cities. There is no concealment, Your Honor. 11 He has never gone any place; he's remained here. Some 12 witness saying that "I would give him shelter" is even 13 proof, because he's here; he didn't go anywhere. 14 There's no evidence of concealment, at least no real 15 evidence.

16 The State says that \$500,000 is a standard 17 bail request for a Murder 3 charge. Reading the 18 allegations in the complaint, however, the charge is 19 simply not well supported. Mike Freeman acknowledged 20 this yesterday when he conceded that proving murder in 21 the third degree to a jury would be, in his words "a 22 daunting task."

23 It appears to me that charging Murder 3 was 24 done in order to request a higher bail, and that should 25 not be rewarded.

Your Honor, a half a million dollars' bail. 1 2 that is not fair; that's a punitive measure; that is a 3 face-saving measure; and it's neither necessary nor 4 supported by the law. 5 Please release Mr. Noor on his own 6 recognizance and order that he turn in his passport. 7 I've brought the passport with me today. 8 THE COURT: All right. I just want to remind 9 everybody that Officer Noor, like any other person 10 charged with a crime in the United States of America, 11 is entitled to the presumption of innocence. If he has 12 a trial, it will be in a court of law, not in the media 13 or in the streets. 14 I will set bail in the amount of 500,000 with 15 no conditions; \$400,000 with conditions. The 16 conditions are: No contact with Officer Harrity? 17 Harnity? 18 MS. SWEASY: Harrity --19 THE COURT: Harrity. I'm sorry. 20 MS. SWEASY: -- H-A-R-R-I-T-Y. 21 THE COURT: I'm sorry. Officer Harrity. 22 Your passport has been surrendered by your attorney. 23 You may not possess any firearms or ammunition, and you 24 must stay in touch with your attorneys and make all 25 court appearances and have no new criminal matters.

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1 We need appearances for the record. We 2 skipped that step. 3 MS. SWEASY: Amy Sweasy appearing for the 4 State of Minnesota. 5 MR. PLUNKETT: Tom Plunkett and Peter Wold on 6 behalf of Mr. Noor. 7 THE COURT: All right. And a next appearance date. 8 9 MS. SWEASY: I think, Your Honor, in order to 10 get the discovery process going so that we can have a 11 meaningful court appearance, we would look for some 12 time in the beginning of May. 13 MR. PLUNKETT: May 8th? 14 THE COURT: Let me get my calender up, if you 15 would. 16 I am scheduled to be in another trial at that time so we could make it at 8:30 or 1:15. 17 18 MS. SWEASY: Either is fine. 19 MR. WOLD: Yeah. Either is fine. 20 MR. PLUNKETT: Either's fine. THE COURT: Well, let's say 8:30. 21 22 MS. SWEASY: 8:30 on May 8, then; is that 23 right, Your Honor? 24 THE COURT: Correct. 25 MS. SWEASY: Thank you.
