

## Protocol for In-Person and ZoomGov Oral Arguments Before the Minnesota Court of Appeals

(Last revised 4/25/2022)

The Minnesota Court of Appeals schedules oral arguments both in-person at the Minnesota Judicial Center in St. Paul and remotely via ZoomGov.

## **In-Person Arguments**

- **Security screening** will be conducted at the entrance to the Minnesota Judicial Center. All bags, belongings, and files must pass through a metal detector. No firearms are allowed.
- Only <u>attorneys</u> for parties who filed briefs on appeal may argue. **If an attorney not listed on a party's brief intends to argue**, a letter identifying the arguing attorney must be e-filed and served on opposing counsel at least 7 days in advance of the scheduled date.
- If more than one attorney will argue as appellant or respondent, attorneys must apportion time and notify the Clerk of the Appellate Courts in writing (filing type: Correspondence Other) at least 7 days in advance.
- Audio recordings of oral arguments are usually available on the court's website within 24 hours.

## **ZoomGov Remote Arguments**

- ZoomGov practice sessions with court staff can be scheduled upon request for the Monday before

## In case of illness or extreme emergency precluding an attorney from appearing as scheduled or appearing in person

(a) notify opposing counsel by telephone or text; (b) notify the court by e-filing and e-serving correspondence, if possible; and (c) contact the court by telephone 651-291-5297, if possible.

Oral arguments may be converted to ZoomGov or rescheduled for in-person argument. In the event an attorney is able to argue, but cannot appear in person (for example, due to a contagious illness), an in-person oral argument may be converted to ZoomGov and still proceed on the same day, at the court's discretion.
