

## **Early Neutral Evaluation Program Agreement Information**

Now that you have come to an agreement at your Early Neutral Evaluation (ENE) session, please know that the ENE process does not end here.

You must draft that agreement in writing for the judge in your case, whether it's a **partial** agreement on some of the issues or a **full** agreement on every issue.

If one or both parties are represented by an attorney in the case, the attorney generally writes this agreement for the judge to review and sign. <u>However, if both parties are representing themselves and there is no attorney on the case, the parties must draft the agreement and proposed order for the court.</u>

Please note if your case is in Sherburne County, the Law Library has a free program to help self-represented parties draft their agreement. Contact the Self-Help Center for more information.

To draft this agreement, the parties may: 1) locate stipulation and order forms on the <u>mncourts.gov</u>, 2) contact the Self-Help Center for assistance in finding these forms or 3) have an attorney draft the documents for you.
